This work made as part of Heart of Glass's micro-commission on the theme of care. It hoped to explore what it means to care by photographing those around me, my colleagues, key workers. Whilst these people have been putting themselves on the front line protecting the elderly they have not been as celebrated as the doctors and nurses within the NHS. It is through these pictures that I hope to demonstrate the people who define what it means to care.

The home I work in has two separate units on one site, and these portraits are of staff from both units. One unit has been completely clear of Covid-19 whilst the other had three positive cases. As of writing we have cleared the site of Covid-19. This is through the determination and will of the people I photographed.

The process of making this work at first seemed like a simple one. These are people that I see most days of the week, and we joke that we see each other more than our families. Asking people to sit for a portrait, and finding the time to do so within a twelve hour shift when everyone is rushed off their feet, stressed, and anxious about the situation proved difficult though. It is because of this I began to go in on my days off, whilst people were having a break, and make quick pictures.

I asked each individual to give me a written statement about what care means to them with pressure of a pandemic on their shoulders. The problem with this is that carers struggle to think and put into words their actions. They just do it. They just care. It is an essential part of their being to put those vulnerable before themselves. Carers learn their resident's habits, mannerisms, routines, likes and dislikes, their needs, and they fully internalise these into their daily modus operandi. So much so that when asked to they can not put it into words. I know this is what caring is. It is negating oneself for others.

I want to thank those that sat patiently, helped me to make this work, and continued to care.

Flightcare COVID19 disclaimer document

This document is to be used in the event of where a resident starts to receive end of life care and the family members wish to attend the home to visit their loved one.

No more than x2 Relatives are permitted at any time.

Only a senior staff member such as Home Manager, Deputy or Nurse in Charge can complete this document.

One of these forms MUST be completed for every visit prior to allowing the relative past the reception area:

Any visitors should leave the home via the nearest exit and not wander freely in the home. If they need to use a toilet, they must use the en suite facility to the room being visited. It will need to be cleaned once they have left the room. They must supply their own drinks and food if needed.
