We hope you enjoy our guidebook to the amazing town of St Helens.

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
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FACTS & INFORMATION

THESE ARE THE FAMOUS SIGHTS OF ST HELENS


The Blue Office

The Blue Office is a skyscraper next to a lake. There is a big fountain in the lake and the fountain is called The Fountains of Fortune. The skyscraper is big and very useful for the people of St Helens. It used to be a glass house but now it's mostly used by nurses. It's one of the most glamorous places in the town which is why we are recommending it to you. We recommend you go and eat something next to the fountains which are beautiful.

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Vincent's Ice Cream Factory This was a factory where they made Italian ice cream a long time ago. It looks more modern than Victorian-style houses but it also has an old look. The windows are different to how windows are made today. It used to be really fun and popular. It's nice because it's not very busy here. The road might be called Strawberry Road.





Sculpture of Zeus

This is a sculpture of a dog called Zeus. He is celebrated because he was small and hopeless but lived for a long time. Zeus had a hole in his mouth and his organs weren't formed yet. He died, but lived a good life. He always warms our hearts.

An Old Bridge



Ted

The Odd Head Out


This is a monument for tourists that signifies St Helens. It's a statue of a girl looking outwards in a kind of creepy way. It's mainly the eyes that are creepy. It's very skinny and tall. It was probably made in the 1980s. We think it represents human growth. It looks like it's a very calm place. People do yoga here. You can come and walk around and be at peace.

Totally Wicked Stadium

This is the St Helens rugby stadium and was most likely made 10 years ago (2010). You can play and watch rugby and football and you can do cheerleading there too. It's vast, modern and well-built. It's a massive tourist attraction because Saints are a very good team. We like how big it is. We also like that it is a vaccination centre now.

NHS Rainbow

This is a sculpture of a rainbow with the words NHS on it. This sculpture is for a lady who works for the NHS helping people who can't talk properly. In these tough times she has taken too many tests to count, been kitted with PPE, all whilst juggling a sick mother-inlaw, two kids and a diabetic husband. She is an inspiration.




The Pyramid of Glass

This is a big pyramid built in the 1860s or it might have been built in the 1760s. Now it is a glass factory and a museum that celebrates St Helens' industry of glass. It represents all of the glass over the years. There are old mines that you can go through, a library, and you can see how glass is made and it is famous. We like browsing the art. There is a good mix of modern and vintage. It's good for children so if you have children go here.

St Helens Town Hall

The Town Hall is where people go to do important work. The mayor has an office there. It's amazing how long it's been around – it looks like it's medieval. They have weddings here and other gatherings and they hold town meetings. We walked there when we walked for Save Our Greenbelt. This is where people make all the decisions. Important people go there but it's not much use for us.



Nan

This is a statue for a Nan. She works in a nursing home where she looks after elderly people all night for 12 hours and she is a loving person. It is a colourful sign that says Nan on it surrounded by stars.

THESE ARE SOME LESS FAMOUS SIGHTS YOU MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT

Bluebell Woods

No one really knows about Bluebell Woods because the path to it is really hidden, but it is really good because there are bluebells and a fire pit and a tyre swing and a river and a fallen tree which we use as a bridge to get to the other side of the river.

The Secret Entrance

There is a secret entrance to the Golden Lion in Rainford. We found it because we saw a football through a hole in the fence when we were playing hide and seek during lockdown. We kept on looking for a way to get it until we found this spot. No one has noticed it since they are busy walking their dogs, so it is still a secret.

The Abandoned Bike Park

I found the abandoned bike park when I was on a bike ride with my dad. Nobody was there. I think it is abandoned because it is in an unknown place in Rainford. I think no one really knows about it because they haven't had the idea of going down the strange path you need to go down to get there. There is a main jump from the top of a hill and something called a table which is up and down with a long flat centre. Another jump is the most difficult because there is a hole in the ramp of dirt that you need to get over to build up speed.

A Cottage on a Hill

THE ORDINARY STREETS OF ST HELENS

If you get away from the town centre you will find the ordinary streets of St Helens, like the streets near our schools where we live.

The best thing about these streets is the people that live there. The people are kind and friendly and the neighbours usually all talk to one another. A lot of the people are pensioners so it's nice and calm and quiet, but also sometimes a little bit boring. Also our families live nearby and most of our friends are there. There are lots of dogs and cats. There are two horses. There's the chickens in our neighbour's garden. There's a goat that always escapes from the farm. When someone's budgie escaped the whole street helped to catch it. The ice cream van stops every Sunday. At night you can hear fireworks.

There's an ice cream shop and a park down the road and out the back of some of the houses there are big fields where we can go and play football or vou can even play out on the road because there are so few cars. Once we did a bingo and another time a karaoke night. During lockdown we all clapped on our doorsteps and everyone went onto their drives and had picnics. On Halloween we go trick or treating with our families and then we go to the woods for an adventure, and on Easter our whole street had an Easter egg hunt. In the spring you can watch the blossoms


fall from the trees and when it snows we have sledging races down the big hill.

Sometimes our neighbours play their music too loud. Sometimes the fireworks go off too late. Sometimes the pensioners can be grumpy. Sometimes there are troublemakers and drunk people. There was a car on fire once and one time our neighbours got robbed. We worry about the crime. We worry about the pollution. We worry about living too close to the bypass. We worry about Malcolm because he is very suspicious. We worry about the haunted alleyway. We worry about all the wasps.

But we still remember the water fight we all had once. And we remember when lightning struck nearby. We remember the funeral, and when the new kids moved in, and when we had a street party. Everyone came out of their houses. We had a really nice time. There are some things on our streets that we know are there but you probably won't see. Things like spiders, pennies in the gutter, tiny pieces of shattered glass, butterflies, footprints and pavement cracks. There is dog pee and cigarette butts, ants and slugs, bird poo and shadows. Beneath the streets are sewers and beneath them are dinosaurs, in the sky there are satellites and the stratosphere, and above that heaven.

There are flies and bees. There is the air and wind and pollution. There are fumes and germs like covid. There are atoms which are very, very tiny and finally, there are ghosts.


You are welcome to visit our streets any time. The people are very friendly.



MAP OF RAINFORD

- 1. The best place in the whole neighbourhood is the VILLAGE CHIPPY as it sells nice food and it's really warm.
- 2. The place that will disappear first will be the CHARITY SHOP because when the older generation dies nobody will be interested in antiques any more.
- 3. The best place to keep a yacht is our SCHOOL because it has a flat roof where you could display it.
- 4. This is the best place to GO WILD because there is so much space. It's also the best place to build a SKYSCRAPER.
- 5. The safest place is the CO-OP because the staff are friendly and it is open a lot.

6. The LINEAR PARK is the best place to hide because it has many hiding places such as bushes, trees and endless greenery.



MAP OF ASHURST AND BROAD OAK

- 1. The best place to keep a pet tiger is SANKEY VALLEY because there are supplies for tigers to survive.
- 2. The best place to have a sleepover is BURGIES WOODLAND because the tent there is so big.
- 3. ASHURST PARK is the place that makes us most angry because it's so boring.
- 4. THE DUCKERIES is the best place to bury treasure because it's massive and has been around for a long time and it's full of bushes and trees.
- 5. The best place for an airplane to make an emergency landing is our SCHOOL PLAYING FIELD because it is big and thick. In the summer they have to be careful because we might be playing on it.

- 6. We think SCHOONER WINES is the most dangerous place because there are lots of gangs hanging around there.
- 7. The place that will disappear first will be GASKELL PARK because probably there will be houses built on it.
- 8. The best place to film a music video is NANNY GOAT PARK because there are loads of objects.
- 9. BOLD MINERS is the happiest place because there are clubs like football, rugby and fun games.
- 10. The worst place is THE FLASH because there's a lot of teenagers that go around with very loud music.



THE BEST THING ABOUT OUR STREETS IS THE NEW PARK WE DESIGNED.

The park is big and green. There are beds that people can plant in and a statue of a panda with flowers on it to attract animals. There is a water fountain surrounded by greenery and a tall wall of plants with a neon flower sign and bird seed feeders. There are pathways and a pond with a bridge over it.

There are squirrels and deer. There is a city farm like there used to be in Sherdley Park. There is a Bug Hotel for insects to have shelter, and a warm place for animals to stay and rest when it's winter and they need to hibernate. There is a dog park, with poo bags and balls and treats for the dogs. There is a community gardening centre, so all the people who don't have much to do can meet up and plant vegetables and flowers. There is a centre for animal adoption and next to it a place called Kitty Pig for people who love animals but can't afford one where they can just go and look at the animals.

There is an adventure playground with a tyre swing, mini ground trampolines, a zipline, a tunnel slide, climbing nets, a running-around doughnut and a rotating bowl. There is a rock-climbing wall and a paintball woods. There is a caged-in football pitch because on the old park the pitch was always too wet and the grass too long to play on and the nets were never on so we had to run after the ball every time it went in the goal. There is an underwater exploration park with a marine zipline across a body of water, with a mermaid and an underwater slide. There is a rollercoaster which is held up by a wall of living plants that absorbs carbon dioxide to help stop pollution.

Now the kids no longer get bored and they are able to get lots of fresh air. We pick the litter every day to make sure the park is always clean. There is a big fun hill to ride your bike down and food and drinks for people with not a lot of money.

And finally, there is a place for children with no teenagers allowed, so that when we play out it is just for us.


WE ALSO DESIGNED SOME OTHER **IMPROVEMENTS**, SUCH AS:

- A community centre for elderly people, with a fire pit, a seating area and a cabana

SOME INTERESTING WALKS



In St Helens there are lots of nice walks to go on. These are some walks we recommend to vou.


A Wild Walk

Start your walk at Ashurst Primary School. Begin by walking up Chain Lane and then walk in a giant circle, going up and down every street that

you come to, until you end up back at Ashurst Primary School again. On your walk look out for a doughnut with rainbow sprinkles and then bring it to me. The most difficult part is doing the walk on your head. Walk on the wall (near Co-op) and try to balance the doughnut. Then go to my nan's house, get a glue gun and other crafty stuff

to make a paper cat. Try to hear an argument or fight on your walk. narrate it from afar. Smell sweet peas to learn how nice they look and smell. This walk will make you feel happy. And make the paper cat cute!!

(Warning: if an argument or fight does break out, make sure they don't hear you narrate or you might get involved.)



A Fishy Walk

Start and end your walk where Carr Mill Dam Road meets Garswood Old Road and walk around Carr Mill Dam in a circuit. You should do the walk bare foot. Look out for horses. The difficult part is the woods. The interesting part is the water because it has fish in it. You will hear the waterfall. You will smell the fish. The walk will make you feel calm.

A Relaxing Walk

Start the walk at Lidl on Park Road and walk along Blackbrook Road then turn left onto Chain Lane. Walk all the way up Chain Lane until it becomes Laffak Road, keep going until you turn right onto Carr Mill Road, then turn right again onto Garswood Old Road and end your walk at The Boathouse at Carr Mill Dam. Look out for Ashurst Primary School. You might hear or see people playing out. The walk will hopefully make you feel relaxed. Your challenge will be that you have to walk in your pyjamas.

A Nature Walk

Start the walk at the area of grass near where College Street meets Hill Street. Walk up College Street until you can turn right onto Islands Brow, and walk down there until you reach Merton Bank Road. Look out for how many birds there are, and look out for the garden centre. See if you can hear bees or wasps. This walk should be nice and can relax you a bit.

An Invisible Walk

If one day you wake up and you are invisible, this is a walk vou could do. First run out of the house and down the street. On the streets of Blackbrook creep around the buildings and the bins, seeing all the smaller things people normally didn't see, like pennies on the floor and rubbish flying by. You can also see the bigger things like homeless people, cold and scared and being brushed past and ignored. Rush back to your house and grab a blanket and some food and drink. Hurry back to the street and carefully



lav out the blanket and the food and drink out. Then go to Splash and have a rest in a tube slide. Go to a shop and borrow a few chocolate bars and drinks (they won't mind because you are invisible). After that run to the cinema and watch all the movies for free. Don't leave the cinema until you hear thunder and lightning, then sprint home in the rain. Make sure to remember your own key because no one else will be able to see you. Get in your best pyjamas and hope to be visible again by tomorrow.
